






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His Ways Are Not Our Ways

The emotions displayed by Job during his suffering as depicted in the book of Job are typical of people in general and some (especially new) Christians when they experience suffering. They are indicators of our need to grow in our relationship with God and in the revealed knowledge of who He is. Some of the emotions displayed by Job gives credence to the scripture that says, "my people are destroyed due to lack of knowledge" (Hosea 4:6). The narrative starts with Job being content with His life while he is enjoying the protection and provisions of God. Job is a righteous man in the sight of God who prays to cover the sins of his children and himself. It is relatively easy for us to express positive emotions and have a trusting attitude toward God when our external circumstances are going well. For many of us, our emotions sometimes get the better of us as the battle intensifies, the test becomes more difficult, or the degree of suffering increases. As Job's circumstances grew worse, his emotions grew darker, and he became more and more depressed and hopeless.

Due to our lack of knowledge and understanding, we most often, as Job did, incorrectly use human reasoning in an attempt to understand our circumstances and we can end up concluding that because we believe our suffering is undeserved, God is not fair. When God appears to be silent during our suffering, we can lose hope, and our trust in Him may diminish. We sometimes reject this unfair God because we are not pleased with the negative events that we believe He has caused to occur in our lives. We may even reject the life He gave us. In Job's defense, when the events in the book of Job took place (between the time of the flood and the life of Moses), God had not revealed much of Himself to mankind up to that time; so, in light of this, Job's application of human wisdom and understanding to the things of God are not so egregious.

We modern day Christians, on the other hand, cannot use the same defense. We have been given the entire Bible and are the recipients of a wealth of revelation and wisdom from God to man. Isaiah 55:8-9 states, "For My thoughts are not your thoughts, nor are your ways My ways," says the Lord. "For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are My ways higher than your ways, and My thoughts than your thoughts." In the New Testament, we are admonished to "renew our minds" (Romans 12:2) and to "have the mind of Christ" (Philippians 2:5-8). We accomplish this by reading, meditating on, and submitting to His word and yielding to the guidance of the Holy Spirit. When we do, we have a better understanding of negative events that occur in our lives, and we would know that suffering has its place in a Christian's life.

In James 1:2-8, the scripture says we should "count it all joy when we face trials of many kinds" and that testing produces patience. In 2 Timothy 2:12, it says that if we suffer with Him, we'll also reign with him. At the end of the book of Job, God speaks to Job, asking, "Who is this that questions my wisdom with such ignorant words?" (NLT) Then He follows with a series of questions that point to His sovereignty. Afterward, Job says, "I have heard of You by the hearing of the ear, but now my eye sees You." His perspective changed with his increased knowledge of who God is. Each of us must take the time to get to know Him.
